Aim and scope

This international research workshop aims to explore innovative, mixed-method approaches to climate impact assessment, with a focus on how environmental disruptions affect socio-ecological systems and challenge organizational sustainability. Bringing together scholars, practitioners, and policymakers from a variety of disciplines, the workshop will shed light on how businesses, communities, and institutions respond to climate-related crises, examining frameworks for adaptive strategies, assess best practices, and explore the role of managerial decision-making in building long-term resilience. Its ultimate goal is to provide an opportunity to spread and disseminate the most recent research on these issues.

Each presentation will be followed by **6–7 minutes** of comments and questions from the audience. **Session chairs** will keep time and ensure that the schedule runs smoothly.








Venue

How to reach us from the city center:

Option 1

- Take Tram T2 from Firenze Santa Maria Novella central train station (both tram stops "Unità" and "Alamanni-Stazione" are fine)
- Get off at tram stop "San Donato Università"
- Walk 6 minutes to the Social Sciences Campus, Via delle Pandette 9

Option 2

- Take **Bus n. 23** from Firenze Santa Maria Novella central train station (both bus stops "**Stazione Scalette**" and "**Scala Orti Oricellari**" are fine)
- Get off at bus stop "Del Prete Terzolle"
- Walk 6 minutes to the Social Sciences Campus, Via delle Pandette 9

How to get to Florence

- By plane: The easiest way to get to Florence is to fly to Florence Airport (Florence Peretola-Amerigo Vespucci Airport; located 4 km from the city centre) or to Pisa International Airport (Galileo Galilei Airport), located about 80 km west of Tuscany's capital.
- From Pisa Airport to Florence city centre: find here potentially useful information.







• From Florence Airport to the city centre: The best option is to take the new tram line (T2) which gets to the heart of the city (tram stop "Unità"). Alternative options are private transfers and taxi.

Cultural activity - Guided tour of the Bargello Museum

To participate in the tour, please make sure you have carefully noted the following:

- The visit is scheduled for **Wednesday**, **December 3** (the day before the workshop begins), with an **English-speaking guide** and audio headsets for all participants
- The meeting point is at 3.00 PM, in front of the <u>San Firenze Suites & Spa hotel, Piazza San</u> Firenze
- The tour **starts at 3.30 PM** however, please **make sure you arrive at 3.00 PM** so that tickets can be purchased and audio headsets distributed
- **Tour duration**: approximately 1.5–2 hours
- Total cost per person (ticket + headset + guide): € 20
- Please **bring cash**, as the guide- who normally does not have a POS payment device will purchase the tickets for the group
